Goal	The aim of the course ist to introduce students to the various elements that make up foreign language teaching as well as the factors that influence it and thus determine it. Introduce them to the categories of foreign language teaching analysis and aspects of teaching observation. By this means, to train students, using practical examples, for independent planning, implementation and analysis of teaching German as a foreign language.
Teaching methods	Presentation, conversational interpretation, explanation of the material by using pictures, handouts and worksheets; group work, individual work, discussion, analysis, research, oral and written homework, papers and seminar papers. Use of computer technologies and the Internet in the teaching process.
Assessment methods	Monitoring student work: continuous commenting and evaluation of their work, task execution, class activities and teaching yields. The final assessment is derived from the assessments of the required activities.

Goal	The students shall first acquire the basics of the Gerrman political, social and cultural history in the period between 1933 and 1945, focusing on the historical phenomena of political totalitarianism (National Socialism), anti-Semitism, the Holocaust, exile and the Second World War. The radical political-cultural rupture caused by the National Socialist seizure of power and the subsequent exclusion and expulsion of many artists led to a division of German-language literature into three separate spheres: Nazi literature, the literature of the 'inner emigration', and exile literature. In this course, different forms of the three literary spheres will be presented on the basis of their poetological and cultural-political concepts and exemplified by representative authors and works. Other cultural formats such as film and visual arts will also be discussed. Students will read a selection of texts from the period (Eberhard Wolfgang Möller: Das Frankenburger Würfelspiel; a selection of poetry; Ernst Jünger: Auf den Marmorklippen; Stefan Zweig: Schachnovelle; Anna Seghers: Das siebte Kreuz; Ödön von Horváth: Jugend ohne Gott) and contribute to the subsequent discussion of these works.
